Institutions made significant contributions to piano sales in 2005. Piano makers estimate the institutional market runs in a 25 year cycle, which is roughly the life span of an acoustic piano being played daily for an average of 10-12 hours per daily. Universities today are buying grand pianos for piano majors and high quality digital pianos for music majors and piano pedagogy majors—future piano teachers.

There were 1.5 million electronic portable keyboards sold in the USA in 2005. According to a recent study, students beginning on a keyboard have a significantly higher dropout rate due to the lack-luster sound, improper number of keys and improper key touch. At Best 10% of the receivers of these keyboards will even be offered the opportunity to take lessons. A keyboard with lessons is better than a keyboard with no lessons. But both fail in comparison to a good quality interactive learning environment on a high quality digital piano with lessons which provides a far better success rate of learning to play music.

Top 10 things to think about when selecting an instrument to practice on

- Are you taking PIANO lesson or KEYBOARD lessons? If you are taking piano lessons, getting an electronic keyboard doesn't make sense. Keyboards have 61 or 76 keys that have plastic non weighted touch, they typically don't come with a pedal a stand or a bench. A Roland digital piano will have 88 keys that feel like a grand piano.
- Touch Sensitive Response? The question you have to ask here is "How many levels of sensitivity?" A keyboard may only be touch sensitive on a scale of 1 to 7, while an acoustic piano has a touch sensitive scale of 1 to 128, which a human will not detect a limit of.
- 3. Why 88 Keys? Students will have music in the first few lessons where they need the full 88 key range of a piano. Also, even if you are only playing in the middle of the piano, your peripheral vision will see all 88 keys, if you practice on less, then go to your teachers piano, it can be confusing and disorienting to the student.
- Weighted touch? It is extremely important to have a fully weighted hammer action to teach proper technique from lesson NUMBER ONE. Good habits are formed from day one
- 5. What about a hand me down piano or piano advertised "Beautiful" of "Antique" or "Free"? A piano might look beautiful on the outside but might need hundreds or thousands of dollars spent on the inside to make it a decent piano.
- 6. What is maintenance? An acoustic piano should be tuned 2 times a year. It has over 10,000 parts which include leather strips and felt that wear out and deteriorate over time. A digital piano never needs tuning and is maintenance free.
- 7. Is Silent practicing important? It may be of you have younger children with naps and bedtimes, or if mom or dad had a stressful workday. Some children are self conscious about practicing. A digital piano with headphones allows students to practice anytime day or night.
- Can it interface with a computer? A digital piano can connect to a computer to take advantage of a vast arrays of educational and creative programs and apps to help piano students of ages and skill levels.
- Does it have a Music Tutor? Since a typical piano lesson occurs once weekly, a Roland Music Tutor offers a between lesson "Practice Partner" the Roland Music Tutor interactively helps students play correct notes and rhythms.
